## Tick Bites - What Do I Need To Know?

We get many requests for an urgent Doctor appointment because of tick bites due to:

- Not knowing how or when to remove the tick
- Mouth parts still attached after tick removal
- Concern about possible Lyme disease

We do not routinely offer a doctor's appointment for tick bites.

There are information leaflets and online resources provided by NHS services which aim to reassure and provide guidance.

We would highlight a number of points which may be helpful:

- 1. The best way of preventing tick borne disease is to prevent being bitten in the first case.
- 2. If a tick has attached then it should be removed as soon as possible.
- 3. Use a proprietary tick remover (available from pharmacies or vets) to remove the tick.
- 4. Do NOT use cigarettes (or other methods of burning), oils, lotions, chemicals or petroleum jelly to remove the tick.
- 5. The tick's mouthparts may remain in the skin, but they will eventually come out. Do not attempt to dig out tick parts left behind in the skin.

If you feel unwell or develop a rash that spreads out from the bite site then consult a doctor. There is no need to see your doctor if you have been bitten but have no other symptoms.
